In discussing the Act itself, he said that the quota of 154,687 per year has never been filled because gives preference to northern Europeans and they do not take up their share of the quota.

He cited the fact that 25,000 Germans and 65,000 Britains can be admitted, but from countries such as Egypt and India only 100 people were eligible under the law.

Dr. Mihanovich believes that the McCarran - Walter Act cannot be amended but must be completely rewritten. The Lehman Bill is an effort to rewrite the present Act and embodies better immigration principles. Dr. Mihanovich urged support of the Lehman Bill.






