ROSH HASHANAH STARTS TONIGHT

In synagogues and temples throughout the world, the Jewish religious New Year will be ushered in at sunset, Monday, September

Monday evening's commemora-tion of Rosh Hashana, which means literally the beginning of the year, inaugurates a ten-day period of spiritual self-analysis and prayer which is climaxed by Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, which begins at nightfall, Wednes-day, October 6.

The ritual for the so-called High Holydays is highlighted by the sounds of the Shofor, or ram's horn, the ancient instrument which once called men to warfare and now calls for combat against wrongdoing and shortcomings. Special prayers and melodies voiced in the worship services stress the themes of repentance and divine







A Yes Vote Means Independence

On Thursday St. Louis will vote on the earnings tax. In addition to representatives of Jewish, Catholic and Protestant religions, many other organizations such as the respected Social Planning Council of St. Louis and St. Louis County have endorsed home rule on the city earnings tax.

The vote will determine whether the city will have control over its financial matters, or whether it will have to continue to depend upon the Missouri State Legislature. If St. Louis approves home rule the earnings tax will be limited to one-half of one per cent-unless another charter amendment will be passed by the city.

One-sixth of the city's income (about \$8 million) comes from the earnings tax. Obviously, a defeat of the home rule charter amendment will force city officials to consider other ways to raise necessary funds.

It is a matter of common sense and civic duty to approve the Minorities—Bryson amendment. A city unable to decide its own financial fate is also unable to plan freely the necessary services and constructions it needs. Independence is a cherished quality. St. Louisans will have a chance to grant independence to themselves this Thursday.

Good Will To Men

The spirit of the High Holiday period is saturated with good will for men. Quite unrationally, from a realistic point of view, we wish for a year without its customary burden of sorrow and anguish. Too often we are disappointed—but we hope. And sometimes our hopes are not in vain.

During the past year this country has made a monumental decision in line with the most respected of American traditions and the religious teachings of all major faiths. It has abolished segregation in our educational system. This embarrassing hangover from a past age was hard to explain. We have now corrected it by demo-

Although an integrated school system should be an accepted fact, the historical circumstances had formed public sentiment to get used to segregation. In the face of pressures to perpetuate such a system, decency has triumphed.

There is no better lesson for the pessimists. Change can be affected. It is a change from fear to contentment, from uncertainty to security, from war to peace, for which we hope. The New Year period, its demand for introspection and self-understanding, might ties. be instrumental in materializing our hopes. May these hopes be fulfilled in the year to come.

Gross, of Staten Island, New York.

The Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America serves as the parent body of traditional synagogues throughout the United States. As a constituent member of such bodies as the National Community Relations Advisory Council, Synagogues Council of America, the Union acts as the national spokesman for traditional Judaism.

One-Third Of Israel's Tire Production Exported

JERUSALEM (ISI)—Over one and a half million pounds worth of tires were produced in Israel during the first quarter of 1954. Of these nearly one third were exported.

Production during this period reached 32,000 tires and 34,600 tire tubes. During this same period, 23,600 tires and 20,540 tubes were sold in the local market. 11,000 tires and 9,000 tubes were exported. The major foreign purchaser of Israel tires is Turkey.

Between the Spanish American War and World War I world events caught up with the non-sectarian character of services provided by American Jewry for soldiers. Large numbers of the hundreds of thousands of Jewish immigrants who had poured into the United States in the late 1890s and the first decade of the twentieth century found themselves, and in many instances their sons, too, drafted for military service during World War The overwhelming need for a full program of Jewishly-oriented morale and welfare activities, and of course for Jewish religious services and literature, brought about an all-out Jewish morale effort in which JWB mobilized institutional and communal resources on an unprecedented scale.

When World War II broke out, JWB was a going concern, with more than two decades of experience in community organization and in providing for the religious and welfare needs of Jewish military personnel wherever American forces were stationed. As the governmentauthorized agency for this work, JWB had the acceptance of the Jewish community.

The prodigious unified Jewish morale effort, launched and carried out despite a far from united community, has been termed Operation Jewish Unity.

Operation Jewish Unity, fortified by tons of religious literature, morale supplies and kosher food, made possible Jewish religious and morale activities around the world—religious services in the Arctic and in the Pacific jungles, seders in Europe, Africa, China and Aus-

With the war's end, JWB reduced but did not dismantle its morale service structure. Wisely, it maintained standby machinery which quickly moved into high gear again when the cold war began in the late 1940s and burst into flame with the war in Korea in 1950. Once again the Jewish community mobilized under JWB leadership. The most striking manifestation of this effort was the precedent-shattering chaplaincy recruitment program in which the rabbinical seminaries and the Central Conference of American Rabbis, Rabbinical Assembly of America and Rabbinical Council of America joined forces with JWB's Commission on Jewish Chaplaincy. This procurement program, which made chaplaincy service a kind of internship for all physically qualified rab-Sinai) to war service.


